School Information

Introduction to the School

Eastbank Primary School is situated at the corner of Shettleston Road and Gartocher Road. It was opened in 1968. Our school comprises of 11 Teaching Areas, Administration Offices, a Gymnasium, a Dining/Assembly Hall, Library, PaTHs Room, a STAR Hotel, Learning Lab and a vibrant Garden Area. We have our own kitchen which provides meals cooked and prepared freshly each day. The accommodation in the school is used out with school hours for after school clubs run by staff and visiting specialists including Dance, Rugby, Football, Spanish, Drama and Netball clubs.

Eastbank Primary School is one of 5 associated Primary Schools, 6 Pre-5 units and 1 secondary school (Eastbank Academy) which combine to form Eastbank New Learning Community. We have an active Parent Council.

Pupil Absence

Within Glasgow Primary School good attendance is encouraged at all times and children and their families are supported if attendance issues arise. Parents are asked to advise if their son or daughter is going to be absent. This should be done as early as possible on the first day of absence. If the young person is going to be absent for some time, it would be helpful to know at the earliest opportunity. The school uses daily text messaging to inform parents and carers of absence if no contact is made. All unexplained absences are investigated by the school and appropriate action taken. Medical & Healthcare

The school nurse visits at various times during the year for routine health checks, vaccinations and medical examinations. Parents are kept informed by letter. If a child becomes ill during the course of the school day, he/she may require to be sent home. Please ensure that you keep the school informed of all contact details.

Parents should inform the school of any medical requirements relating to their child. If a child requires medication during the school day, parents must complete the appropriate medical form. This is available on request from the school office.

Emergencies

We make every effort to maintain a full educational service, but on some occasions circumstances arise which lead to disruption. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, temporary interruption of transport, power failures or difficulties of fuel supply. In such cases, we shall do all we can to let you know about the details of our closure or re-opening by using letters, texts and the local media etc.



School Uniform

Our uniform was agreed in consultation with pupils and parents. It is expected that all children attending Eastbank Primary School will adhere to this dress code. We have a free school uniform bank with lots of different items of our uniform available in different sizes. Parents and carers are welcome to take any items needed for their child/children.

PE Kit

It is important that pupils come prepared to learn and for PE this requires appropriate clothing. All jewellery should be removed. Pupils who are not participating in PE must have a note or a medical certificate. Pupils who are unable to participate in practical PE should still bring their kit to allow them to assist in the lesson by refereeing, keeping scores or assisting with the distribution of equipment. This ensures that they are still able to take part in some way in the work of the class and do not miss out on the knowledge and understanding of the course.

There are forms of dress that are unacceptable in school, such as items of clothing which:

- Potentially encourage factions (such as football colours)
- Could cause offence (such as anti-religious symbolism or political slogans)
- Could cause health and safety difficulties (such as loose-fitting clothing, jewellery)
- Could cause damage to flooring
- Carry advertising particularly for alcohol or tobacco
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils

Clothing & Footwear Grants

Parents/Carers receiving Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance (Income Based), Working Tax Credit (check link below for thresholds), Housing Benefit, Council Tax Benefit or Universal Credit (check link below for thresholds) will normally be entitled to monetary grants for footwear and clothing for their children. School meals

Our school provides a lunch service which offers a variety of meals and snacks. Medical diets for children can be provided. Children who prefer to bring packed lunches will be accommodated in a suitable area.

All children in P1-5 are entitled to a free school meal. These can be ordered online, in advance and we recommend that you look at the choices and discuss these with your child.

If you plan to send your child/children to breakfast club, you should inform the staff of any medical dietary requirements.

Children and young people of parents/carers receiving Income Support, income-based Job Seekers Allowance, Working Tax Credit (check link below for thresholds), Child Tax Credit only (check link below for thresholds), Universal Credit (check link below for thresholds) and income-related Employment and Support Allowance are entitled to a free midday meal. Eastbank Academy staff work with our pupils from Primary 6 onward to prepare them for the transfer to secondary school.

Communication with Parents

At Eastbank Primary School we use a variety of ways to keep in touch.

Open Door Policy – the senior leadership team are available for all parents and carers at any time providing they are not teaching or in another meeting. Please either pop into the school office or phone for an appointment.

Newsletters – will be sent out on a regular basis to keep parents informed about the work of the school.

Letters – further information which requires a response may be sent out in letter form.

School website & Bluesky – will contain a great deal of information about the school. It is a good idea to check this regularly.

School Emails – You may also receive email reminders about events/school closures etc.

Meetings - Parents and carers are welcome in the school to discuss any aspect of their child's development and progress. To avoid disappointment, it is advisable to make an appointment. There are various opportunities throughout the year when parents can discuss their child's progress with the class teacher and view your child's work.

Parents and carers are welcome at other events throughout the school year e.g. workshops, information evenings, class performances, religious and other assemblies. The school newsletter and website will keep you informed.

Emergency Contact Information

At the start of each school session, parents will be issued with the annual data check form. Please ensure that this is completed and returned to the school. It is also important that you let us know if there are changes to your telephone number(s) or to those of your emergency contacts throughout the year.

Appointments during school hours

If your child has an unavoidable appointment, please give them a letter for their class teacher and then collect them from the school office at the specified time.



Data Protection – use of information about children and parents/carers

We collect information about children attending school (and also about parents/carers, emergency contacts etc. provided in the annual data check) to allow us to carry out the Council’s functions as the education authority for the City of Glasgow. This may sometimes involve releasing personal information to other agencies and other parts of the Council, particularly in relation to child protection issues or criminal investigations, and it may also be used for research purposes (see the link below for more details regarding this).

Information held by the school is, in legal terms, processed by Glasgow City Council. Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence 3-18

Curriculum for Excellence is the curriculum in Scotland which applies to all children and young people age 3-18, wherever they are learning. It aims to raise achievement for all, enabling young people to develop the skills, knowledge and understanding they need to succeed in learning, life and work. As part of Curriculum for Excellence all children from pre-school to the end of S3 will receive a rounded education known as a Broad General Education (BGE). Curriculum for Excellence is all about bringing real life into the classroom and taking lessons beyond it.

Through the experiences we provide at Eastbank Primary School we want our children to become Successful Learners, Confident Individuals, Responsible Citizens and Effective Contributors. We are committed to providing children with a broad general education and focus on eight curricular areas.

Progress in learning is indicated through curriculum levels as detailed below.

Level	Stage
Early	The pre-school years and P1 or later
First	To the end of P4, but earlier or later for some
Second	To the end of P7, but earlier or later for some
Third & Fourth	S1-S3, but earlier for some

Expressive arts: The inspiration and power of the arts play a vital role in enabling our children and young people to enhance their creative talent and develop their artistic skills.

Health and wellbeing: Learning in health and wellbeing ensures that children and young people develop the knowledge, understanding and skills which they need now and in the future to help them with their physical, emotional and social wellbeing.

Sciences: Science and its practical application in healthcare and industry is central to our economic future, for our health and wellbeing as individuals and as a society.

Social Studies: Through social studies, children and young people develop their understanding of the world by learning about other people and places both past and present, societies, their beliefs and values.

Religious and moral education: Religious and moral education includes learning about different world religions and supports the development of beliefs and values.

Languages: Knowing other languages and understanding other cultures is a 21st century skill set for students as they prepare to live and work in a global society.

Mathematics: Mathematics equips us with the skills we need to interpret and analyse information, simplify and solve problems, assess risk and make informed decisions.

Technologies: The range of subjects in technical education has changed significantly over the last two decades and now includes craft, design, engineering and graphics.

There will be opportunities throughout the year for parents and carers to learn more about aspects of the curriculum and to be consulted about significant changes if appropriate.

Religious Observance

Our school is non-denominational and teaches Religious Education in line with Scottish Government curriculum for excellence guidelines. We are a diverse community and strive to be welcoming to all. We have a close link with Sandyhills Parish and the minister assists with the Christianity element of Religious and Moral Education. We also include religious festivals as part of our programme of assemblies and invite representatives from different faith groups to attend and present at these. If this is something that you would be interested in supporting, please contact the school office.

Parents and carers can request that their children are given an authorised absence from school to celebrate recognised religious events.

Assessment & Reporting

All children are assessed both formally and informally throughout the year. This allows children and their teachers to identify their strengths and areas for improvement. A variety of assessment methods are used to enable staff to pass on information to parents about the progress of their child. Assessment records are kept by the class teacher and form the basis of discussion at Parents' Evenings in October and March. An annual report is sent to parents towards the end of each school year.

If you have any concerns about your child's progress do not hesitate to contact the school.

Support for Pupils

The school has a duty to ensure that all pupils have equal access to the curriculum, with appropriate support for their needs if required. This applies to the content of lessons, teaching strategies and minor adaptations to the school environment. There are a wide range of factors which may act as a barrier to learning. We are committed to working closely with parents and carers to ensure that they are fully involved in any decisions about support for their children's needs. Promoting Positive Behaviour & Paths

Children's Rights as outlined in the UNCRC (United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child) are fundamental to a good school ethos. Adults in our school will work with children to ensure they are aware of their rights and fully respect the rights of others. Therefore, the approach within Eastbank Primary School is to build a positive ethos that demonstrates care and respect for all. Positive behaviour is recognised and celebrated. Our school operates a system of class charters to set out expected behaviour. This is celebrated through positive reinforcement, awards at assemblies and certificates sent home to parents. The highest standards of behaviour are expected of pupils at all times. Where this is not the case, a variety of sanctions are used. Parents are asked to co-operate with the school in encouraging a sense of responsibility and good behaviour in their children.

Home Learning

Continuing to learn at home helps children to achieve more and is a vital part of our partnership with parents. Twice a year we have a four-week block of Shared Home Learning tasks. These cover a wide range of activities and are differentiated dependent on stage with some tasks related to class topics. These activities will enhance Personal and Social Development and also give children the opportunity to learn at home in a fun and purposeful way. Children should complete a minimum of four tasks over the four-week period and will share their learning through a class display.

We also have a variety of family learning opportunities throughout the year where parents and carers can come into school and work together with their children and staff. Our family learning sessions have included STEM, numeracy, literacy, health and wellbeing and religious education activities. Parent Council

We have an active Parent Council that represents the views of all parents. All parents are welcome to attend Parent Council meetings and can become members at the AGM in September. The Parent Council is a group of parents/carers selected representing all the parents of children in a school.

Our Parent Council helps by:

- Supporting the work of the school
- Representing parents' views to the Headteacher, education authority and HMIE
- Promoting contact between the school, parents/carers, children and the local community
- Fundraising
- Involvement in the appointment of senior school staff

Every school's Parent Council will be different because it will be parents/carers in each school who make the key decisions. The Parent Council is also entitled to support from the education authority in fulfilling its role.

Article 29 Time Masterclasses

As part of our work on Rights Respecting Schools, we have started Friday afternoon masterclasses. This gives our pupils the opportunity to develop their skills and talents in line with Article 29 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the child. Children can sign up to a masterclass for a 4-week period where they will have the opportunity to learn a new skill or develop a talent. We are currently developing the masterclass system and would welcome any input from parents or carers in terms of resources or volunteering their skills to help us offer a more varied program of learning. Pupils currently have the option to sign up to the following classes:

- Art
- Games & Film Club
- Dancing
- Drama
- Sports
- Coding
- Drawing
- Lego

We also have a House Captain Team, Eastbank Explorers Pupil Equality group, Rights Respecting Schools Committee and RotaKids who are meeting throughout the session to work on projects and make improvements in our school.

Extra-Curricular Activities

We have a wide range of activities that run between Monday – Thursday to extend the learning experience. These currently include football, dance and multi-sports club. Please check your child's schoolbag and email for information as places are popular and usually limited. Good links with community organisations and our Active Schools Co-ordinator are vital for the success of these programmes.
